The procession through the Pretoria townships took place in front of thousands of sullen Africans, and the visit to Atteridgeville was kept short as police reported fresh trouble

brewing.


Roads strewn with cricket ball-sized rocks told of the extensive stonings which took place.

Everywhere there were truckloads of police on natrol, with the helicopter darting overhead and nosing into potential trouble spots.

Strategic points were under

the control of armed policemen, many of them taking a sleep dog-tired in blazing sunlight under heavy blankets while fellow police kept watch.

In an interview, the board's director, Mr C H Kotze, told the press: "It is impossible even to start to estimate the damage, except to say that I don't think it will be in the millions." - Own Correspondent and Sapa
