structure of the National Union as a federation of Student Councils. Students
elected their SRCs which affiliated to NUSAS and represented their students
in the National Union. The SRCs elected delegates to the Student Assembly,
which was thepolicy-making body of NUSAS and elected its Executive. At centres
where the SRC was not affiliated, individual students, numbering at least 10,
formed a NUSAS Branch which applied for affiliation and elected representatives
to the Student Assembly,

Mr Tonkyn and Miss Marshall moved "That this Student Assembly, noting (a) that a five-year banning order was served on the NUSAS President, Mr IanRobertson, on 11th May 1966 and (b) that the Minister of Justice refused, at a meeting with representatives of the National Union, either to give reasons for the banning order or charge Mr Robertson in a court of law, reaffirms (1) its condemnation of the arbitrary banning of Mr Robertson, (2) its coal to the Minister of Justice either to charge Mr Robertson in a duly-constitute; bourt of law or to release him from the provisions of the banning order, (3) that it will continue to regard Mr Robertson as President of NUSAS until he resigns or until his term of office expires."

Messrs Poplak and Kane-Berman moved an amendment "That the following words be inserted after 'banning order' in clause (2), 'and continues to believe him innocent until proved guilty in such a court'." This was accepted by Mr Tonkyn and Miss Marshall.

SANSPA, SAFSJZ, AMSSA, World Assembly of Youth and Mr T. Coombe, an ex-President, also sent messages.

Later in the meeting, Mr Savage of NUS of England, Wales and N. Ireland, addressed the meeting, followed at a later stage by Mr I. Honeyman representing the Scottish Union of Students. Miss Marshall was in the Chair.

Academic Freedom and University Autonomy

Messrs Suttner and Guelke moved "That this Student Assembly, in order to make known once again its attitude to academic freedom and university autonomy both generally and in S.A., states that (1) it believes university autonomy to be the independence of univs. from State or other external control, which autonomy, it believes, will allow univs. to promote academic freedom by reserving for themselves the right to determine, according to academic criteria, who shall teach, what shall be taught, who shall be admitted to univ. and how the teaching is to be carried out, (2) it believes that the use of univ. autonomy by a univ. to deny the right of entry to certain students on grounds other than academic merit is an abuse of univ.

autonomy, and that, at the same time, any attempt by a govt. to infringe univ. autonomy in order to implement an ideology, is an abuse of univ. autonomy as well as an abuse of academic freedom, (3) it believes that academic freedom, which implies the admission of students on the basis of academic merit only, is a fundamental part of democracy as defined in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, and that any truly democratic govt. must uphold academic freedom at all costs, even if necessary at the cost of interfering with the univ. autonomy of univs., (4) it believes further that academic freedom cannot be said truly to exist until the time when accessibility to education generally and higher education in particular is made available to and accessible to all members of a particular nation, and that it is the responsibility of the govt. to work for conditions in society which will realise this belief."

Messrs Herzenberg and Wallace moved an amendment, "That the following words be deleted: 'the use of univ. autonomy by a univ. to deny the right of entry to certain students on groundsother than academic merit is an abuse of univ. autonomy, and that, at the same time', and 'and that any truly democratic govt. must uphold academic freedom at all costs, even if necessary at the cost of interfering with univ. autonomy'."

Messrs Gross and Hirschmann moved an amendment "That the words
'State-aided' be added before the words 'university to deny the right

Coleman and Johnston then moved a further amendment, "That this Student Assembly deletes all the words after 'that' and substitutes 'That this Student Assembly, believing (1) that it is unwise to encourage overseas academics to take action which can be interpreted as collaboration with the SA govt, (2) that overseas academics should be free to decide whether or not they wish to teach in SA, therefore instructs the Exec. to communicate this to the Anti-Apartheid Movement'."

Mr Daniel's ruling that this amendment was not contradictory, was challenged; a vote of Assembly overruled this, and the amendment therefore fell away.

Before the resolution below was adopted, Messrs Guelke and Johnston moved an amendment "That this Assembly adds, in clause (a) after 'on their campuses', the words' or under the auspices of the SRC or subcommittee'." This was accepted by the movers.

Messrs Thompson and Cowley moved an amendment "That this Student Assembly replaces all the words after 'belteving' with 'that social segregation is incompatible with academic and human freedoms, that freedoms of association are fundamental freedoms which are the rights of an individual and a community and that social practice should be left to the discretion and conscience of individuals, notes that some Univ. Councils continue to enforce a policy of social segregation, a policy completely contrary to the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and contrary to the spirit of a univ. community, recommends to Student Councils that they continue their struggle for the recognition of human dignity and eradication of all forms of racial discrimination within the Univs'."

During the debate, Miss Marshall ruled that past actions of SRCs were not relevant to the discussion. Her ruling was challenged and on a vote by Assembly, it fell away. Assembly also voted to extend the time of the debate for a further period, and closure was later accepted.

The amendment of Messrs Thompson and Cowley was lost 26-47, with 2 abstentions, Rhodes and Miss Prentice recording their votes in favour.

Hemson and Miss Schermbrucker moved "That this Student Assembly, noting (1) that many citizens, and amongst them several students, have been detained in terms of the Criminal Procedure Amendment Act, (2) that the National Union has already expresses its opposition to features of this law, and in particular to the so-called 180-day detention clause which allows for arbitrary detention in solitary confinement, (3) that allegations of brutal treatment have been made by detainees held in terms of this law, (4) that persons detained under this law have frequently given evidence for the State, therefore reaffirms its opposition to those clauses of the Act which abrogate the rule of law and respectfully requests the Judiciary not to accept evidence which seems to have been given under duress."

Messrs Kane-Berman and Philips moved an amendment "That this Student Assembly delete the words 'and respectfully requests the judiciary not to accept evidence which seems to have been givenunder duress' and replace them by 'especially since it believes that evidence given under duress should not be admitable incourt'." This was accepted by Mr Hemson and Miss Schermbrucker.

Mr Daniel took the Chair.

Miss Schermbrucker then withdrew her seconding and Mr Kane-Berman seconded the motion.

Messrs Hemson and Kane-Berman withdrew their motion temporarily to re-word sections, and it now read frompoint (4) onwards: "(4) that persons detained under the law have frequently given evidence for the State, therefore reaffirms its opposition to the 180-day clause of this Act, and expresses its belief that evidence given under duress should not be admissible in court."

Mr Diamond and Miss Schermbrucker moved an amendment, "That this Student Assembly deletes all words after 'That' and replaces them with, 'Noting (1) that many citizens, and amongst them several students, have been detained in terms of the Criminal Procedure Act, (2) that the Nat. Union has already expressed its opposition to features of this law, and in particular the so-called 180-day detention clause which allows for arbitrary detention in solitary confinement, (3) that allegations of brutal treatment have been made by detainees held in terms of this law, (4) that persons detained under this law have frequently given evidence for the State, therefore reaffirms its opposition to aspects of the law which abrogate the rule of law, and respectfully requests the Judiciary not to accept evidence which seems to have been given under duress'."

Messrs Katz and Guelke moved an amendment, "That all words after 'rule of law' inthe amendment be deleted and replaced by 'and respectfully requests the Judiciary, while in no way implying any censure of the Judiciary, not to accept evidence which seems to have been given under duress'." This was accepted by Mr Diamond and Miss Schermbrucker.

During the de bate, Assembly voted to continue for a further period of 30 minutes, and closure was carried.

The <u>amendment of Mr Diamond and Miss Schermbrucker was carried</u> 40-32, with 2 abstentions, Rhodes and Messrs Kane-Berman, Margo and Orkin recording votes against. The metion as amended was carried.

Mr Herzenberg asked whether, if passed, this wouldrule out of order his later "loyalty" motion. Miss Marshall said it would. Her ruling was challenged and Assembly voted that Mr Herzenberg's motion would be acceptable later.

Messrs v.d. Merwe and Moeletsi moved an amendment "That this Student Assembly amends the motion by deleting the words 'responsible people' and substituting for them, 'South Africans'. "This was accepted by Messrs Poplak and Maraj.

Messrs Margo and Diamond moved an amendment, which is not set out here, as it was later accepted by Assembly by 52-16, with 3 abstentions, and is therefore set out below, as the motion as amended.

During the debate, closure was carried, and Assembly voted first to continue the debate and then to close discussion.

Mr Blight reported that SANSPA had received an invitation to send a representative to the ASPU conference on 7th July at Stellenbosch. He had accepted. He had not been invited to the ASB conference, but had arrived in Stellenbosch on 4th July and had been able to sit at the press table.

He informed the meeting that the new ASB President was Mr Boy Galdenhuys of Stellenbosch.

Papers were presented to the conference on aspects of the congress theme "Unity", together with reports from the executive and local committees.

As a result of the Director of International Relations' report, ASB had adopted a resolution calling on the government to put an end of the American Field Service's "threat to South Africa's youth potentiallin favour of American interests",

Papers were read to the congress on "Historiese Oorsig en Ontwikkeling van Eenheid in SA", "Eenheid in Taal en Kultuur", "Eenheid in die Staatkunde", "Menheid in Kerk en Godsdiens" and an address was given bby Prof. Verhoef on "Begripsbepaling en Probleemstelling."

An attack had been made on NUSAS. This was not on the agenda, and the chairman had given the impression that it was not of much concern, with such words as "nie as belangrik beskou nie", "bloot kennis te neem", and "moet nie skaam wees om die waarheid voort te dra."

Resolutions had been taken thanking the Prime Minister for calling on artists to draw their inspiration and material from the heroid deeds of our time; supporting the Vereniging vir Christelike Hoër Onderwys in their efforts to have the conscience clause removed from university statutes and to allow universities to decide their principles for themselves; on American Field Service; thanking the government for all they had done for S.A., including their fight against communism - to do something positive, signatures were to be collected supporting the resolution, and a dramatic hand-over was planned, such as a team of ruppers from Beit Bridge to Cape Town.

Mr Blight's personal impressions were that the ASB considered the old struggles for the establishment of the identity and influence of the Afrikaner as having been won. There was a new and far more dangerous struggle ahead, because the new enemy was invisible. Mr Blight said he was distressed by the continued use of "war imagery". There was a great fear that the "volk" had become lukewarm about its hard-won ideals, hence the theme "Unity". There had been a call for a reorganisation of the ASB, as the Bond was not truly representative, the student bodies were not being taken along with the ASB and the ASB was not getting through to the students. Mr Blight felt that the most remarkable feature of the ASB congress was perhaps the unanimity, even uniformity, in the papers read, resolutions and elections - there had not been a single vote against anything in the three days he was present.

All policy was based on Christian National principles, and Christian references were frequent. In private conversation, Mr Blight found that real contact was not usually made until he explicitly said that he was a Christian; often it was only then that they found real grounds for discussion. He generally found a sincere interest on this basis, and searching questions were asked about principles, differences and NUSAS, and especially how a Christian could be a member of NUSAS without compromising his principles. They discussed their different interpretations of unity. Mr Blight felt quite at home - they had a similar approach to problems - although they did differ fundamentally. He managed to discuss, with a very few, where they differed on theological and interpretational bases. He felt sympathy with the ASB, especially as such obvious sincerity by them was so misplaced.

Official ASB-NUSAS negotiation was, according to Mr Blight, unlikely to be fruitful, but he recommended that each could invite individuals or individual SRCs from the other group to attend congresses as well as contact on inter-SRC level.

Before the resolution below was adopted, Messrs Shill and Kgosane withdrew a clause inserted after "nevertheless", reading "in view of the positive attitude of certain lecturers and students at some ASB-affiliated centres".

During the debate, closure and equalisation of debate were carried, and Assembly also voted to discontinue the debate for a further 30 minutes.

Before the resolution below was adopted, Mr Hirschmann gave the following information about the ASB-NUSAS debate, in a statement issued on 1st July:

"We have noted statements to the press reputed to have been made by the ASB President, Mr D.A. du Toit, in connection with the proposed debate between the Presidents of the ASB and NUSAS.

"We wish to attempt to rectify the impression created by Mr du Toit and state clearly what the present facts are.

"The original letter was written by the Wits SFC President, Mr D. Hirschmann, on April 25th, 1966, and invited the Presidents of the two bodies to debate in the Wits Great Hall. The letters were of an identical nature and proposed the following conditions:

- "1) That both speakers be given an opportunity to speak for an equal time in whatever language they choose,
- "2) That there should be questions only if both speakers agreed to this,
- "3) That the Mits SRC invite students from neighbouring university centres.

"The NUS.S President accepted, and after his banning, the Vice-President, Mr John Daniel, agreed to take his place. Mr du Toit accepted on May 20th. His letter was an extremely encouraging one, and I quote: 'Laat my toe om dadelik te sê dat ek beslis te vinde is vir so'n debat waar die breë studentepubliek dan die standpunte kan aanhoor... Ek gaan ook akkoord met die algemene riglyne waarvolgens u meen dat die debat gevoer moet word'.

"Mr du Toit suggested that the debate take place in August.

"On June 10th I wrote to the ASB and NUSAS suggesting definite

dates for the debate.

"At this stage we find the statements by Mr du Toit confusing. Firstly, we have not yet heard from Mr du Toit in t is regard. Secondly, he has in fact accepted the invitation. Thirdly, the reasons reported to have been given by Mr du Toit for now changing his mind appear artificial.

"In the statement which he is reported to have given, one of the reasons for cancelling the debate is that Ian Robertson has been banned after Mr du Toit's acceptance. The date of the banning was May 11th, and the date of Mr du Toit's letter of acceptance was 20th May, that is, 9 days later.

"Secondly, Kennedy's visit is given as a reason. By May 20th, it was already quite clear that Kennedy was coming to South Africa, and what the arrangements for his trip were.

"Thirdly, since May 20th, NUSAS has not taken any new policy, and certainly there have been no drastic alterations to its views which are the same today as they were then.

"It is for these reasons and in view of the fact that Mr du Toit originally appeared so keen on the debate, that we find reports in the newspapers confusing.

"It remains our sincere wish that the debate shall take place, as it can only be of benefit to all students to hear the views of both sides. We are unable to understand why the ASB should refuse to state its policy and views before an audience composed of students from both NUSAS and ASB centres. We hope that the newspaper reports did not reflect Mr du Toit's views accurately, and if they did, we appeal to him and to the ASB to reconsider their decision."

Mr Hirschmann said that the Wits SRC intended to re-issue the invitation to the Presidents of ASB and NUSAS to debate in the Wits Great Hall.

The motion of Messrs Herzenberg and Wallace was lcst 3-61, with 7 abstentions.

Mr Damourantji recorded his vote for the motion.

Those against the motion and amendment were:

- a) Messrs Katz and Suttner because they regarded the flying of any flag as totally unnecessary, the flag of S.A. was not representative of or acceptable to all S. Africans, and this being the case, there was no necessity for an investigation.
- b) Mr Hodes because the flag was representative of a segregated SA and not of a united 18,000,000 people.
- c) Messrs Saffery, Short, Tonkyn and Miss Pillay, because the SA flag was viewed with hostility by the majority of SA people, and they therefore believed that exhibiting the SA flag at integrated functions would hinder rather than promote race relations in SA.
- d) Miss Moore because she did not feel that the flag of a country needed to be flown at a conference held in SA by S.Africans. She did not feel that the flag was necessary as a show of patriotism, nor that the flag would gain in stature by being flown constantly in fact, it would become too accepted and ignored.
- e) Messrs Maraj and Thompson recorded their votes against motion and amendment.

Abstentions were recorded by Messrs Cantin and Hulley and CTTC.

EXCHANGES, TRAVEL, TOURISM, MEETINGS, THE STUDY OF FOREIGN LANGUAGES, THE TWINNING OF TOWNS AND UNIVERSITIES WITHOUT DISCRIMINATION AND SIMILAR ACTIVITIES, SHOULD BE ENPECURAGED AND FACILITATED AMONG YOUNG PEOPLE OF ALL COUNTRIES, IN ORDER TO BRING THEM TOGETHER IN EDUCATIONAL, CULTURAL AND SPORTING ACTIVICIES IN THE SPIRIT OF THIS DECLARATION.
- "5. "SUCH ORGANISATION, IN CONFORMITY WITH THE PRINCIPLE OF FREEDOM OF ASSOCIATION, SHOULD PROMOTE THE FREE EXCHANGE OF IDEAS IN THE SPIRIT OF THE PRINCIPLES OF THIS DECLARATION AND OF THE PURPOSES OF THE UNITED NATIONS SET FORTH IN THE CHARTER.

"ALL YOUTH ORGANISATIONS SHOULD CONFORM TO THE PRINCI-PLES SET FORTH IN THIS DECLARATION.

"6. A MAJOR AIM IN EDUCATING THE YOUNG SHALL BE TO DEVELOP ALL THEIR FACULTIES AND TO TRAIN THEM TO ACQUIRE HIGHER MORAL QUALITIES, TO BE DEEPLY ATTACHED TO THE NOBLE IDEALS OF PEACE, LIBERTY, THE DIGNITY AND EQUALITY OF ALL MEN, AND IMBUED WITH RESPECT AND LOVE FOR HUMANITY AND ITS CREATIVE ACHIEVEMENTS. TO THE END THE FAMILY HAS AN IMPORTANT ROLE TO PLAY.

"YOUNG PEOPLE MUST BECOME CONSCIOUS OF THEIR RESPONSIBILITIES IN THE WORLD THEY WILL BE CALLED UPON TO MANAGE, AND SHOULD BE INSPIRED WITH CONFIDENCE IN A FUTURE OF HAPPINESS FOR MANKIND."

Universal Declaration of Human Rights

Messrs Herzenberg and Wallace moved "That this Student Assembly revokes the support of NUSAS for Articles 2 and 21(3) of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. This Assembly further subscribes to the spirit of the remaining Articles where these affect student affairs."

Mr Wallace announced that he was seconded the motion for purposes of discussion.

Article 2 reads: "Everyone is entitled to all the rights and freedoms set forth in this Declaration, without disctinction of any kind, such as lace, colour, sex, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status. Furthermore, no disctinction shall be made on the basis of the political, jurisdictional or international status of the country or territory to which a person belongs, whether it be independent, trust, non-self-governing or under any other limitation of sovereignty."

Article 21(3) reads: "The will of the people shall be the basis of the authority of government; this will shall be expressed in periodic and genuine elections which shall be by universal and equal suffrage and shall be held by secret vote or by equivalent free voting procedures."

During the debate, closure and equalisation of debate were warried.

The motion was lost 1-62, with 2 abstentions.

The Finance & Organisation Commission recommended very strongly that a Research Officer be appointed. He would take office in January 1967 and would be paid R9 O per month (with the usual allowance paid to Executive members when travelling). It was decided by the Standing Committee that the procedure for election would be as follows:

- 1) Nominations to be called for at Assembly and also for a month after Assembly.
- 2) The nominees would be interviewed by the Executive, and would be required to submit resumes of qualifications, experience etc.
- 3) The Research Officer would be elected by the Executive and the announcement of the successful candidate would be made as soon after Congress as possible.

Advisory Board

Erising out of the report of the Finance & Organisation Commission, it was decided that the Advisory Board be renamed the "Advisory Panel", the word "Board" being unsuitable since it implied that the members met, which was not in fact the case. The recommendation from the Standing Committee was that the Panel should comprise one person from each region, as well as not less than three people from the region in which the Head Office was situated.

- 3) If there was more than one nomination for a post, the nominees would leave the meeting, as well as visitors. Discussion would then follow. Speeches should be in favour of a nominee rather than against a nominee. The nominees would then return to the meeting and would be entitled to vote.
- 4) Voting would be by secret ballot,
- 5) Only voting members of the Student Assembly would be entitled to vote in the elections, and alternate delegates were asked to move back from the Assembly seating to facilitatedistribution and collection of ballot papers.
- 6) If there were nore than two nominations, the candidate with the most votes would have to receive more votes than the other candidates combined, i.e. an overall majority. If this was not the case, the candidate with the least number of votes would be eliminated and a re-vote taken.
- 7) Res. 40/66 was referred to, noting the number of Executive resignations during the past year and the fact that this affected the efficiency of the Executive, and expressing the hope that students standing for Executive positions would be sure that they could serve their full term of office before accepting these positions.

Report of the Commission on Freshers! Reception

1. General Policy

- a) The Commission felt that some form of fresher reception is beneficial and desirable, because it helps to integrate the new student into the full life and traditions of the university or college.
- b) Aims: Fresher reception must aim to make the new student accepted. Making an exhibition out of him, or isolating him, does more harm than good. Emphasis should not be placed on "putting the fresher in his place", but on endeavouring to make him a part of that place.
- c) Integration period: It was thought that fresher reception be concentrated into a period of between two and three weeks. The programme should be full.
- d) Enforcement: No fresher should be forced to participate, this suggestion being both impracticable and undesirable. However, freshers should be urged to attend functions in their own interest, e.g. freshers can be induced to attend by the requirement of a pertain number of stickers for eligibility at the freshers' ball one sticker being given for attendance at each function,
- e) Co-ordination: Co-ordination in the residences is relatively simple. Notice boards can be used. Students in the town can be organised into wards, according to area, with a chairman of each ward.

2. Reports from Centres

Centres represented on the Commission gave details of fresher reception arrangements on their respective campuses. UN.P and Rhodes had conducted full inquiriries into intiation. While traditions and customs of centres were respected, it was felt that there was considerable need for change and improvement in the majority of these centres, particularly in the residential section.

Programme

The Commission strongly recommended that centres take notice of the fact that integration should be approached and co-ordinated on two levels:

- a) the university or college level.
- b) the house or residence level.

At the university or college level:

- a) A freshers' reception committee should be appointed by the SRC,
- b) A member of the House Committee of each residence should be a member of this committee (ex officio),
- c) The Committee should be chaired by a senior member of the SRC. It was felt that the Committee would have respect and standing in the university or college, and would be able to organise the integration programme with the necessary authority.

Address by Chairman of Reception Committee

It was suggested that the chairman should address freshers and explain the functions of the committee, strongly urging them to take part in all arranged activities. The emphasis of this address should be the breadth of a true university education. ("We cannot afford to have many campus babbages").

The integration programme can be loosely divided into four headings:
(a) academic, (b) cultural, (c) sporting, (d) social.

- a) Academic. It was suggested that (i) the freshers should be addressed by a member of Senate (e.g. the Vice-Chancellor or Dean of Students) on academic life in the univ. or coll., and by the Deans of Faculties. On the same evening, the senior librarian might give a brief address, and pamphlets on the library be distributed. A tour of the library could be arranged after the meeting. (ii) Senior students from each faculty should be selected to discuss courses with freshers at an organised venue.
- b) <u>Cultural</u>. (Forgive me for using this term very loosely). The Commission recommended (i) an address to freshers by (a) the SRC President, who can explain the functions and nature of the SRC and introduce the members, (b) The chairman of the Academic Freedom Committee, (c) the President or Vice-President of NUSAS, (d) the chairman of the Rag committee, (e) a member of the SRC on the importance of society activities on the campus. (ii) After this meeting, it was agreed that new students could find out about and join societies of interest if society chairmen set up desks in the hall. Details of societies could thus be collected, and questions asked on a personal level.
- c) Sport. (i) The chairman of the sports union should give a brief address. Chairmen of sports clubs could then set up desks in the hall, and encourage or exclain the new potential. (ii) Freshers' sports day it was stated that a day of sport for freshers had been a success at several centres.
- d) Social. (i) Any number of socials can be held. Freshers must be encouraged to mix as much as possible (especially if they are hoping to dispel the common freshette fixation for senior men!).
- (ii) Freshers' ball. This should be a big occasion. UN.P referred to their cancellation of Freshers' Concert this year, and the cabaret show produced at freshers' ball to take its place. The best performers were selected and there was considerable rehearsing etc. The same degree of enjoyment was achieved without the normal embarrassment of the concert.

(iii) Sing-songs: Members of the Commission gave examples of the excellent spirit that can be built up in a series of sing-songs.

At the House or residence level:

Many residences are, to a large extent, autonomous. The Commission thought that this was a good thing, but that this autonomy should not be used to keep the worst aspects of initiation alive. In many residences there was evidence that this type of initiation was practised, merely because it was tradition. There is great scope for the individualism that so many residences desire within the spirit of integration that has been defined. Separation of first years into their own residence was very strongly opposed, because it was felt that initiation should be regulated from within the residences. The Commission recommended that SRCs should work more closely with house committees, discussing the integration in conjunction with them. House committee representation on the reception committee was suggested for this reason. If the wardens and the authorities in the houses had the same policies as the SRC, integration on the two levels would be co-ordinated and successful. The Commission felt that on many oscasions not enough had been done to work with the houses.

General: Integration was thought to be important because, in many respects, the initial work of coll. or univ. life made a strong impression. At the end of the 2-3 week period it was hoped that first years would become an effective part of the student body.

Appendix 2.

Report of the Select Committee on School Education

The short time available to the Commission seriously hampered the ambit and scope of the Commission. It was difficult to come to conclusions, and we found curselves barely scratching the surface of this complex topic.

The Commission again adopted the humanitarian concept of education in that it felt the interests of the individual to be paramount in society. The prime function of education was the full and balanced development of the individual on the basis of the full availability of equal educational opportunities. This was not meant to imply that there was a basic contradiction between this concept and the relating of education to the society in which it functions. It was felt that achievement at school has become the key to occupational security, particularly since schools are being used as agents for the selection of elites. It was emphasised that knowledge should consist of facts, and should not be dependent upon ideologies.

Examinations

The Commission advocated the comprehensive system of education. A general education was to continue until the end of Std. 5, when streaming was to take place. This streaming would lead up to the "ordinary" level exams at the end of Std. 9. At this stage, those who did not intend going to univ. would enter advanced colls. of technology, while the remainder at school would specialise for a year at the end of which they would sit a univ. entrance exam set by the universities.

The idea of progressive testing was adopted. In addition, from Std. 6 onwards, pupils would be given projects and assignments to increase their proficiency and encourage individual initiative.

Teaching Methods.

It was felt that regular seminars and refresher courses for teachers should be held to educate and train them in the latest teaching methods. Education should never be presented as a dry irrelevancy, but rather as a vigorous training to cope with conditions found in an advancing technological society.

Organisation.

The commission aimed at a system of education standardised on a non-racial basis, where teachers received equal pay for equal work, and salaries were put on a competitive footing with industry. A particular advantage of such a unified system was that it would involve a more compact administration, and would avoid the duplifation of educational facilities. While such a reform would be costly to introduce, this long-term investment was seen as both necessary and worthwhile. The commission felt that any improvement to the education system should be in addition to present expenditure, and should not be at the expense of any sector of the school population.

It was felt that far too little was spent on education all round. There was a need for considerable revision and improvement of facilities such as laboratories and libraries and for the introduction of universally compulsory education. It is interesting to note that 4.3% of our national income is spent on education, while this figure is doubled in industrialised countries and multiplied in developing areas.

Teacher Recruitment Campaigns

Teacher recruitment campaigns should be organised at the different centres. Particularly in Stds. 9 and 10, pupils should be encouraged to visit open exhibitions at Teacher Training Colls. and Univs.in order to interest them in this profession.

Modern Aids

The commission felt that the maximum advantage should be taken of the range of audio-visual aids available. Special attention should be paid to closed circuit television and language laboratories, and it is suggested that a report on this aspect be prepared by centres and presented to the Minister of Education.

Teacher-Lides

These people can relieve the teachers of a great deal of administrative work, leaving them with their hands free to teach their pupils instead of spending the greaterpart of the school day filling in forms. This is particularly important in primary schools where pupils require constant supervision.

Education Weeks

Attempts should be made to hold quarterly Education Weeks at all centres. Each week should have a theme (e.g. Current Trends in SA Education). Lectures, films, debates, symposia and exhibitions should be included.

Education Seminars

It was felt that regional and rational seminars on education should be introduced.

Education Commission

The committee felt that research officers should be appointed at centres where this is possible. They would be co-ordinated by a chairman (Research Officer or Director of Student Relations) and would offer prominent educationists the services of the committee to do research into the educational system, particularly if their findings would be of practical value. Alternatively, the commission could present reports on research programmes decided on by the Research Officer. Reports would be forwarded to him and he would then be responsible for collating all this material, and distributing it nationally.

Next Committee

It is strongly recommended that a programme for the next Select Committee be drafted and circularised well in advance of Congress in order that people will have time to clarify their ideas and be better prepared

Appendix 3.

Report of the Select Committee on University Education

Introduction

As was the case last year, the Select Committee found that the time alotted to it was insufficient.

The scope of the Committee was felt to be far too broad. It is recommended that future Congresses appoint one Select Committee to investigate University Education, and a separate Select Committee on the tribal colleges.

In addition to the need for more time being allotted to the Select Committee, it is recommended that the agenda for discussions be circulated to centres before Congress, in order to allow time for participants to conduct research into topics which they select and which are delegated to them. It is felt that the role of the Select Committee has been misunderstood. Many participants have attended meetings in order to learn about univ. education, whereas in fact participants in the Select Committee should be making an intelligent contribution on the basis of prior research,

It is felt that greater emphasis should be placed on the activities of educational Select Committees. The Committee feels that NUSAS can make an effective contribution as an authorised critic on S.A. education.

Research Officer

The Committee felt that it was essential that a Research Départment be created as soon as possible. The Committee noted that the Executive had found great difficulty in finding a person to fill the post of Research Officer. It was felt that the post had not been sufficiently well advertised on the campuses.

It was recommended that the Executive draw up an article on the functions and duties of the Research Officer, to be circulated to centres and student newspapers.

In the light of past difficulties in trying to find someone to fill the post, and the likelihood that difficulties would also be encountered in the future, the Committee recommends that a Secretary for Research be appointed on the same basis as other non-voting unpaid Executive posts. This person would carry on the work of the Research Department as acting head, until such time as the Research Officer is appointed. The latter would then become head of the Department.

Faculty Councils

It was reported that such councils played an important role at Wits. Elected on the same basis as the SRC, these councils each have a representative on the SRC. The Committee favours the creation and strengthening of these councils and the expansion of their activities. The emergence of strong faculty councils would facilitate contact between the SRC and the student body generally. A representative faculty body is of great assistance to students in presenting to the staff the grievances, criticisms and suggestions of the students of that faculty. Staff-student relations are also likely to be improved through the activities of faculty councils. Faculty councils can organise social activities for staff to meet students. This can never be done on a large scale by the SRC. Also, a body with general duties like the SRC can never deal effectively with the specific details and problems of each particular faculty.

Rating System

The possibility of instituting a system whereby students rate their lectures, was discussed by the Committee.

A system recently introduced on United States campuses, whereby a group of semior students tour the various classrooms and periodically publish a critique on the campus, was considered unsuitable for this country, for a number of reasons.

An alternative system was put forward. It was suggested that machinery should be set in motion whereby, when a lecturer completed a course on a given topic, each student in the class may first of all rate the course according to how valuable he found it, on a standard rating scale. Secondly, each student may be called upon to make comments on the content, presentation or any other aspect of the course. These ratings and comments could then be handed in anonymously to the lecturer.

It was the feeling of the Committee that such a system might do much to improve many university courses. On the one hand, the lecturers would receive valuable constructive ideas concerning their performance. On the otherhand, the students would welcome this democratisation, which gives them an opportunity to voice their views on their courses anonymously to the lecturers concerned, and would ten to listen to lectures more critically.

Tribal Colleges

The Committee found that certain common conditions prevail at all the tribal colleges.

Lecturing standards are not at all high. Most lecturers come from Afrikaans universities and have a poor command of the English language. Students have reported that lectures are delivered from UNISA notes.

Library facilities are very inadequate. As a result of the recommendation of last year's committee, Student Assembly instructed the Executive to urge Student Councils to collect second-hand textbooks. As far as can be ascertained, little has been achieved as yet. The Committee regards this as a vital matter, and suggests that careful plans be formulated in order to collect these books. The Committee recommends that Regional Directors make a concerted effort to get Student Councils to collect books from their students. The Regional Directors would then distribute them to the relevant students.

In order to provide intellectual stimulus to students at the tribal colleges, the Select Committee recommends that university centres inform students at the tribal colleges of lectures, debates and conferences being held at their centres, which may be of interest to students at the tribal colleges.

It is also recommended that texts of interesting talks be sent and that Regional Directors, in conjunction with Student Councils, ensure that faculty councils send copies of their journals to students attribal colleges.

The Committee found that most students were very ignorant about conditions in the tribal colleges. It is recommended that a fact paper on conditions at the tribal colleges, with particular reference to academic conditions, be prepared for mass distribution at all centres. It is felt that this may dispel the impression that non-whites

"have their own universities which can take their place among the best universities in the world."

The Select Committee once again recommended that faculty councils try and establish contact on a faculty level with other univs. and univ. solls. It is felt that contact of an academic nature is far more likely to succeed than any other approaches to the tribal colleges.

The Select Committee felt that the methods and standard of tuition at univs, and univs colls, should be of interest to professional bodies such as the Bar Council. It is therefore recommended that the Executive investigate the possibility of arranging regular conferences, with the various professional associations, in order to discuss (a) the status of degrees conferred, (b) the type of training required and (c) the standard of lecturing, tuition etc at SA univs. and tribal colleges.

General

- 1) The Select Committee discussed the establishment of the Arts Faculty commission of inquiry at the Univ. of Witwatersrand. It is recommended that all Student Councils encourage the establishment of similar commissions of inquiry.
- 2) Members of the Select Committee werepuzzled at the basis of differentiation in the allocation of finance to the Univs. and the difference in fees at the various univs. It is recommended that this be investigated by the Executive.
- 3) Non-white students studying at the Univ. of S.A. have found that there is a great dealy in obtaining books from the UNISA library. It is recommended that Regional Directors try and assist students at our Correspondence College Branch by collecting books from the centres in the same way as for the tribal colleges.
- 4) Last year Student Assembly recommended that centres try and organise education weeks. As far as can be ascertained, nothing has been done about this. The Committee feels that there is a great deal of ignorance prevailing about SA education generally and that an education week with lectures on CNE, Bantu Education, univ. apartheid etc, would be of great assistance.
- 5) It was reported that certain centres had employed student counsellors to advise students on personal and/or study problems. The Select Committee feels that every univ. should appoint personnel specially qualified to advise students on their problems.

NATIONAL UNION OF SOUTH AFRICAN STUDENTS

6 ASTITUTION

CHAPTER 1.

1. NAME

(a) The name shall be the "National Union of South African Students", hereinafter referred to as, NUSAS.

INTERPRETATION OF TERMS

- (a) A <u>Constituent Centre</u> shall mean the affiliated Student Council of the University, University College or Teachers' Training College or other institution of higher learning, or a Branch of NUSAS at a similar institution provided that its Student Council is not affiliated to NUSAS.
- (b) NUSAS Head Office shall be the office at which the administrative work of NUSAS is performed.
- (c) A <u>Special Resolution</u> shall be passed by a two-thirds majority of representatives present and voting at a Student Assembly and by a simple majority of centres at Student Assembly.
- (d) A Student shall be a member of an institute of higher learning which is not a school and which awards degrees, diplomas or certificates in South Africa.
- (e) If there is any doubt about the meaning of any word or the interpretation of any Section of this Constitution, the decision of the Student Assembly thereon shall be final.

OBJECTS

- (a) To represent the students of South Africa nationally and internationally, and to establish and/or maintain their co-operation with the students of other countries.
- (b) To promote and defend democracy in student affairs, in the Universities and in South Africa.
- (c) To maintain and further genuine co-operation, in a spirit of tolerance, good will and mutual respect, among all students.
- (d) To uphold the right of all students to meet, assemble and study together on a basis of full equality, and to promote the ideals of academic freedom.
- (e) To promote the educational and general interests of students, and to guard their rights as students and citizens.
- (f) To encourage the interest and/or participation of students in welfare and/or educational community projects.
- (g) To perform all such other acts as may be necessary to further the above objects.

Composition/

4. COMPOSITION

(a) Defining Clause

- (i) NUSAS is a Union of Students governed as a federation of Constituent Centres and having group or individual membership.
- (ii) NUSAS shall have perpetual succession and the power to hold property and be vested with proprietary rights apart from its members, and it shall sue and be sued in the name of the "National Union of South African Students."

(b) Group Membership is open by affiliation under Section 5 to:

- (i) Student Councils of Universities, University Colleges, Teacher Training Colleges, or other institutions of higher learning.
- (ii) NUSAS Branches.

5. METHOD OF AFFILIATION AND WITHDRAWAL

- a) By a Student Council:
 - (i) affiliating its institution, which affiliation shall entitle any of the students to enjoy any of the facilities offered by NUS.S (this shall be known as "Jentre Enrolment"), or
 - (ii) affiliating itself and thereby automatically enrolling all individual students (this shall be known as "Automatic Enrolment"), or
 - (iii) affiliating itself and enrolling those students who individually signify to the Student Council their wish to be members of NUSAS (this shall be known as "Individual Enrolment").
- b) At those institutions where the Student Council has not affiliated or where there is no Student Council, by a NUSAS Branch consisting of at least ten individual members affiliating itself.
- c) In the event of a Constituent Centre wishing to withdraw from NUSAS, two years' notice of withdrawal must be given.

6. METHOD OF ENROLMENT OF INDIVIDUAL MEMBERS

- (a) Eligibility for membership of NUSAS, whether Individual, Associate or Honorary, does not take into account language, colour or creed.
- (b) (i) Individual Membership is open to any student as defined in Section 2 of this Constitution.
 - (ii) At a Constituent Centre such membership shall be effected through such centre.

(c) Associate Membership

(i) Past students and members of academic staffs of any institution of higher education in South Africa, and others interested in University education, may apply to become Associate members of NUSAS on payment of an annual or life subscription, as provided in Clause 31 (4).

(ii) Associate members shall not be entitled to representation on the Student Assembly nor election to the Executive, but, at the discretion of the Student Assembly, may be entitled to any or all of the facilities offered by NUSAS to its members.

(d) Honorary Membership

The Student Assembly shall have the power by a Special Resolution to elect as Honorary Life Members people whose interests and services are closely allied to the interests of NUSAS.

(e) Cessation of Membership

If he is deemed to have acted or to be acting in a manner detrimental to the interests of NUSAS, any member may be deprived of his membership, whether Individual, Associate or Honorary, and any member of the Executive may be deprived of his office, either by a Special Resolution of the Student Assembly, or, should the Student Assembly not be in session, by a two-thirds majority of the Executive, subject to the subsequent ratification of the Student-Assembly-in-Council; provided that in either case such person shall be given reasonable notice of action pending against him, and an opportunity to defend himself before the Student Assembly or before a meeting of the Executive, as the case may be.

CHAPTER II.

STUDENT ASSEMBLY

Composition

The Student Assembly shall consist of representatives from the Constituent Centres and the Executive.

8. Voting Powers

- (a) The number of votes allocated to a Constituent Centre shall be determined according to the formula in sub-clause (b) hereof applied to the number of registered students in the case of Centre Enrolment and to the number of NUSAS members at any other centre.
- (b) The number of votes of Constituent Centres shall be decided according to the following formula:
