

#### Academic Freedom and University Autonomy

## ELECTIONS

# ASSEMBLY COMMISSION ON ORGANISATION AND LOCAL AMFAIRS

Madam President, Members of Assembly

It gives me great pleasure to submit the Commission's report, which is of necessity more in the form of a working paper than a full report. Members of the Commission will be glad to answer questions or explain recommendations fully in debate or off the floor.

# A. Main Problems Considered

# 1. Inefficiency and reakdown in Communication

At present the Local Committees and branches correspond with the National Directors through Head Office. Firstly, this correspondence has never been accurate, and there is no effective way of ensuring that it is. Letters were answered after long delay or not at all. Secondly, even where correspondence is regular the National Directors cannot ensure the efficient functioning of their departments through the post. Where a Local Committee Department breaks down, there is nothing the National Director can do, except ask the regional Director in the area to investigate. This involves further correspondence and delay. The National Director is greatly hampered by the fact that in most cases he is not in personal contact with the Local Directors.

Where the "ational Director is himself inefficient, the situation is even worse. When a local department breaks down, there is no one whose concern it is to remedy matters. The system cannot here rely on the Local Committee Chairman, who may be the source of the trouble. Head Office or the Regional Director must then shift for the best, and in all probability the Local Committee will continue to flounder for the rest of its term.

What is nedded, is effective, on the spot supervision.

#### The National Executive

Manpower of the calibte demanded by posts on the National Executive is in short supply. For some years the Assembly has had difficulty in finding the right people to fill Executive posts, which increase every year. Many of theseposts were originally created to accommodate specific people on the Executibe and there is no justification for their retention.

A far more pressing consideration in this regard is that of finance. NUSAS simply cannot afford any longer the luxury of a huge Executive.

Furthermore, some posts do not involve enough work for a full Executive member. The Executive must be drastically reduced in size, and departments compunded where necessary, or abolished.

# 3. Lack of Co-operation between SRCs and Local Committees

In most regions it was found that there is little cooperation between SRCs and Local Committees. The causes for this are many, but the following seem to be the most common.

The SRC takes little or no interest in the Local Committee. There is none of the close contact which one might expect to find between a council and one of its subcommittees. In the first place the SRCs shoulder an increasingly heavy burden of work. The Local Committees were originally established to relieve them of a part of this buden, and it is unrealistic now to expect the, to take an interest in the details of Baby sitting, Vacation Employment etc.

Instead of NUSAS functioning through the channels of its federal structure (ie through Head office to SRCs and the Local Committees) there is a short circuit between Head Office and the Local Committees bypassing the SRCs. In consequence, the Local Committees, left very much to their own devices tend to forget or disregard the fact that they are subcommittees of the SRCs. All their correspondence is usually direct with Head Office, and there is a tendency for them to view their own SRCs from the outside as it were. This basic misconception of their role on the part of the Local Committees partly explains the occasional clashes between the SRC and its Local Committee on policy matters. The Local Committees feel closer to Head Office than to the SRCs.

This bypassing of the SRC further contributes to the SRCs lack of interest in Local Committee affairs. "ecause it is not concerned with the implementation of departmental policy on a local level, the SC feels no responsibility for this implementation. This is all the more regrettable when we consider that delegations to Congress, the policy making body, are drawn from SMCs and not from the Local Committees.

# 4. Position of Local Committees of larger campuses

It is not possible to generalise here but the following remarks concern a trend which, while it is now in evidence only at the larger centres, seems likely to involve other Local Committees in the not too distant future (on a national level this trend is already far advanced and represents a real challenge. It is a challenge that the National Executive must meet without delay).

There is a growing and very important factor in recent student affairs. This is the very rapid development of faculty organisations, both on campuses and nationally. These organisations are concerned solely with the interests of a particular section of students. They are efficient. They have narrower aims and can focus their resources on meeting the special needs of, eg, commerce or engineering students. In the field of benefits they have a decided advantage over the local committees, and the latter cannot hope to opmpete.

It is necessary therefore, that on campuses where these faculty organisations are making their presence felt, the role of the NUSLS local committee must be redefined.

#### B. General Recommendations

#### 1. Regional Autonomy

The responsibilities of the present National Directors must now devolve on each region. The local committees must be under regional, not national supervision. Those to whom they are responsible must be in personal contact with them, and correspondence with Head Office eliminated.

The Commission recommends the constitution of Regional Standing Committees, along the lines of the National Standing Committee. These will decide on regional planning, and account to Head Office. for the implementation of policy in their region. The Local committees will continue to cooperate on a regional basis through the Regional Councils. More emphasis will be placed, however, on the elimination of unnecessary duplication of activities within the region, and assistance by larger centres to smaller centres, especially branches ... (Details of the proposed Regional Standing Committees and the Regional Councils below).

It is important that this regional autonomy be complete in its sphere. Half to change the system of responsibility to Head Office would be worse than not to change it at all.

It is not intended that Head Office be deprived of any say in the regions. It will still have control over the Regional Directors, whose position as Executive members is in no way compromised. But the first responsibility in a region will rest with that region, thus relieving Head Office of the day to day burden of administration and freeing the President for more important work.

Notes (1) the coming year will be a difficult one for Head Office. Finances do not permit the necessary salaried assistance. In addition it is proposed that the Executive be reduced in size. It is suggested therefore that Head Office consider delegating specific tasks on the national level to one of the regions. Thus the freshers' pamphlet could be produced by one region for all, relieving pressure on Head Office and the President. This sort of delegation can be increased as the regional systems settle and grow.

(2) Finance - in accordance with the recognition of Regional autonomy, it is recommended that the Regional Councils be allocated some financial resources eg the money allocated for Regional Seminars. It is recommended that the spending of this money be entirely at the discretion, except of course firstly, that the Regional Standing Committee or National Executive may intervene if things go wrong and secondly that the money be spent for the purpose specified, of Regional

Councils.

Where Regional Councils wish to embark on regional ventures which require more monye than is their to dispose of, they must apply to the Regional Standing Committee whose members can then decide whether or not their SRCs will contribute. If the SRCs do agree to chip in, their contribution will be spent in that region and will obviously not pass thhough Head Office.

# Reduction in Size of the Executive

The Commission did not have time to debate this point fully. The matter was discussed however, and it was generally suggested that the National Executive must be drastically reduced in size. It is recommended that the posts of National Directors of Scho; arships and Travel be Presidenital Secretyaships. The other Departments could be abolished on the National level or be compunded under a single . executive member - eg Presidential Secretary for Student Relations. The majority of the Commission was in favour of the abolition of the Department of Studies.

#### Tighter Relationships between SRCs and Local Committees 3.

It is strougly recommended that SRCs appoint of of seven members of the local committee. Further Head Office should at all times recognise that the Local Committees are organs of the SRCs and not of the National Union.

It is hoped that by giving the SRCs expligit responsibility through the institution of the Regional Standing Committee for the welfare of the whole region, the SROs will take correspondingly increased interest in the National Union matters in the region.

The name 'NUSAS Local Committee' was felt to be misleading. It suggests local branches representing a national body rather in the way that embassies represent their respective states in a foreign country. The psychological value of a change in name will be obvious. Draft Committee had some difficulty on this point but suggests "Committee for National Union Affairs". We believe that this suggestion should be implemented as soon as possible, and that it will point more to the identification of the Local Committees with their centres and not with Head Office.

#### New Role for Local Committees at larger centres 4.

Time does not permit expanse on this recommendations which conerns only Wits at the moment, and possibly UCT in the not distant future, It is recommended that the Regional Standing Committee in the Transvaul investigate the matter and cirulate a report to centres.

The general idea is that a large centres the Local Committee should act through an existing student clubs and societies instead of alongside them, ie, encourage all student activity.

#### C. Regional Standing Committee

The regional Standing Committee is intended to represent the main power structure in each region, as also those resources on which the National Union is dependent in that region for its viability. In this regard the Regional Standing Committee is analogous to the National Standing Commiyyee but it is concerned with its region and policy for the region and in no way derogates from the functions of the National Standing Committee. Its members would be:

(a) Members of the National Standing Committee in that region (b) The Regional Director who shall represent the NUSAS branches in the way that the President represents the branches on the National

Standing Commitee

(c) In certain regions, the Regional Standing Committee as constituted in terms of (a) and (b) above, may decide to include among its members a representative of certain centres in the region, in addition to the Regional Director (ie in the Eastern Cape, the Regional Standing Committee may wish to have on it a representative of the Federal Seminary and Fort Hare).

#### Meeting, Chairman, Reports to Head Office 2.

The members of the Regional Standing Committee shall choose a chairman from among themselves. The chairman need not be the Regional Director.

The Committee shall meet at least every two months and preferably before a meeting of the Regional Council. The Commission forsees that the members of the Committee will meet regularly on an informal basis and believes that this practice should be encouraged in each region.

The Regional Director will submit a full report to Head Office and the other Regional Directors at least once a month.

## Suggested aims and Responsibilities

(a) Regional planning - to coordinate the resources of the "egion for the maximum henefit of all the NUSAS centres in the region.

(b) To decide policy specifically for the region. This should be confined to practical policy - such as increased cooperation within the region, or contact with tribal colleges.

(c) More especially, to establish machinery whereby smaller centures

can benefit from the larger centres.

(d) To encourage the development of Student Leadership in the region particularly through Regional and National seminars.

(e) To secure further affiliations to the National Union in the

region.

(f) To supervise the finance of the Regional Council.

(g) To decide on expenditure for Regional matters which are not covered by NUSAS, and further to decide on a distribution among its members of responsibility for these additional expenses.

(h) To issue joint press statements or organise joint protests of common concern or interest abd generally to take such joint action as it considers necessary or advisable in the interests of NUSAS in the region.

(NOTE: Press statements would have to be signed by the members of the Regional Standing Committee severally, excluding the Regional Director. They cannot be made in the name of NUSAS.)

(i) To make contact with Head Office and other centres.

#### D. Regional Council

#### 1. Composition, officers

The Regional Council is based on the existing institution and is designed to provide machinery for cooperation and coordination between local centres in the region on the implementation of policy, such cooperation is aimed at eliminating unnecessary duplication of activities and at making the best use of the manpower and resources of all the local centres in the region and for the implementation of policy in the region.

The members would be

(a) The Regional Director

(b) Branch Chairmen

(c) Local Committee chairmen (ie SRC members if previous resoluti is adopted)

NOTE: It is suggested that the respective Regional Standing Commission decide at their first meeting whether larger centres should have than one representative on the Regional Council, and if so, how many

At its first meeting, the Regional Council would elect the following

(a) a secretary to the Regional Committee and Director

(b) a regional seminar organiser.

#### Meetings

The Regional Director shall call a meeting of the Regional Council at least once a month. The Secretary will keep the minutes which will be circulated to all SRC members and to all members of local committees.

# 3. Aims and responsibilities (suggested)

- (a) to execute the regional planning of the National Standing committee.
- (b) to make recommendations to the National Standing Committee on regional matters.
- (c) to elect and dismiss a Regional Secretary and Regional Congress Organiser.

(d) to organise a Regional Seminar.

- (e) to implement departmental policy of the National Union and the Regional Standing Committee (subject of course to the xisting proviso that any centre may disassociate itself from NUSAS policy and instruct its local centres accordingly).
- (f) to promote cooperation between branches and the larger centres.

(g) to provide assistance to smaller centres or branches.

NOTE: The Regional Council cannot make any public statements or take any policy decisions.

These recommendations are intended to be applied by the Regional Standing Committee to the particular requirements of their region. Unfortunately there has not been sufficient time to consider them fully on the floor. It is suggested that Assembly be asked for its general approval and that Head Office and the heads of centres them go ahead with implementing the scheme.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE CONSIDERATION OF EACH REGIONAL STANDING COMPLETED ARE APPENDED.

## ORGANISATION COMMISSION APPENDIX I

#### RECOMMENDATIONS TO REGIONAL STANDING COMMITTEE IN THE WESTERN C.PE

These proposals deal only with points of particular implementation of the provisions of the main report in the Western Cape.

# Standing Committee

To include, in addition to the SRC Presidents of UCT and CTTC, the Vice President of the UCT SRC. This is suggested for the following reasons

- 1) He deals mainly with the administrative affairs at UCT; thus he is in a position to advise on the committal of the UCT administrative resources.
- 2) CTTC SRC has really no resources at all, thus the "power structure" in the region would be better represented.

On request from the Regional Council, the Standing Committee should be empowered to co-opt a representative of the Branches (elected by those Branches).

# Regional Council

Composition to remain as in the past, except that the national executive members in the region and the SRC Presidents should no longer be required to sit, although they may do so ex-officio.

Further it shall include the Regional Secretary which it shall appoint. The Secretary shall be ebtirely responsible to the Regional Director.

The Council shall appoint three "Regional Coordinating Secretaries" of Seminars, Publicity and Fact Papers, and Fund Raising and Travel respectively. These would normally be the three coordinators of the executive on the NUSAS local fommittee at UCT; once again, UCT is the only centre which has sufficient facilities for this kind of work. These Secretaries should sit on the regional council. The SRCs will be represented by the Chairmen of the local committees, who are automatically SRC members.

The Council should explore the possibilities of some other combined regional "departments".

## Meetings

As regional cooperation is something of a new concept, rather more meetings of both the Council and especially of the Standing Committee may be necessary here than in otherrregions.

Thus the Standing Committee should meet, in the first week of each month. This meeting should be closely followed by a meeting of the Regional Council, within the next few days.

## ORGANISATION COMMISSION APPENDIX II

# RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE REGION I STANDING COMMITTEE IN THE TRANSV. L

#### Standing Committee

The consensus of opinion on composition of this committee was that the small centres shall not be represented. The SRC of JTC is not a constituted body at present but it is hoped that their President may soon be able to join the Presidents of Wits and JCE on this committee.

Finance - The Standing Committee must have ultimate control over the finances of the region. This includes the NUSAS Regional Grant. A budget should be presented to the Standing Committee by the Regional Director if possible on the proposed expenditure of the Regional Council. The Standing Committee may, in practice, delegate its responsibility to the Regional Director to facilitate expenditure.

## Regional Council

#### Composition

In addition to the proposals of the Local Affairs Commission report, every effort should be made to contact, and obtain observers from the Faculty Councils at Wits. It is hoped, in this way, to interest a broader spectrum of students and to facilitate cooperation between them.

#### Officers of the Council

Two secretaries should be elected. Wherever possible one Secretary should represent the interests of the small centres. The Regional Secretary should be responsible for circulating information on scholarships, for maintainin files on all circulars and information emanating from Head Office and the Regional Councils.

Special attention must be paid to the financial problems of small centres and branches. Avenues must be opened so that these branches can raise funds, wither together or individually, in venues on the large campuses where venues are not normally open to them.

Regional Council meetings should be advertised and opened freely to obseveres.

#### Local Committees

The only major changes envisaged by the changed structure of the Region occur on the Wits Committee, viz
The following portfolios should be scrapped:
Studies; Travel; Libraries; External Officer.
The following portfolios should cater for the whol region:
Student Relations; Publicity and Travel; Benefits Council.

Various portfolios, eg Newsboards should be retained to absorb labour. The Vice Chairman should be the coordinator of campus activity and the merging of interests should be his main concern.

## Branch Activity

The following activities are considered well within the potential of all small branches

- i) the organisation of talks of general and academic interest
- ii) Participation in community projects.
- iii) Fundraising.

Members of branches can obtain benefit from the following campus activities and information:

- a) Scholarships
- b) Vacation Employment
- c) Tutorial Schemes

The branch chairmen should be responsible for the Travel portfolio.

Branches should ensure that members of the branch are frequently contacted; brought together and advised on what facilities are available to them ib the region. Communication within each branch has been the main stumbling block to date.

# ORGANISATION COMMISSION APPENDIX III

# RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE REGIONAL STANDING COMMITTEE IN NATAL

## Regional Standing Committee

## Composition

a) The committee shall consist of the Regional Director and the SEC Presidents of UND, UNP, and UNNE.

6) The function of the Secretary shall be performed by the Regional Director where necessary.

# Functions and Powers

These are well covered by the Draft Committee report. It must be borne in mind, however, that these points are generally applicable and will have to be modified in order to match the perculiar characteristics of the Natal region.

## Meetings

These will take place at least once every two months, and the verial will rotate between the 3 main centres - UND, UNP and UNNE.

These meetings shall be of a confidential nature, except in the case where directives are to be transmitted to the SRCs, smaller centres and Regional Council.

These meetings should precede those of the Regional Council.

#### Regional Council

#### Composition

The council should consist of

(a) Chairman - Regional Director

(b) Regional Secretary who shall be responsible for typing minutes etc.

(c) A regional seminar organiser who could possibly also be Congress organiser for one of the two areas of activity, ie Durban and Pieter-maritzburg. He will also be responsible for coordinating fund-raising.

(d) Local Committee Chairmen and one other representative from the university centres, In addition there will be one representative from the centres DSU, SACHED, Dormerton, and NTC

Therefore total membership will be 13.

#### Functions and Policy

In addition to the Draft Report, it must be pointed out that this Council is under the direction of the Standing Committee. It is in effect a magnified Local Committee and is in a similar to the Standing Committee as the Local Committee is to the respective SRC. The object of this council is in themain to draw in the smaller centres and to give them a feeling of empathy with the workings of the region and NUSAS as a whole.

#### Meetings

Meetings should be held at least once a month; the regional council is more than the former informal type of regional meeting held in Natal and will need regular meetings.

The responsibility for drawing up the constitution of the regional council will be with the Regional Standing Committee.

# Local Committees

It was felt that the Local Committee Chairman should always be a member of the SRC is possible, he should at least be an ex-officion member.

The restructuring of the Local Committee should be left to the Local committees themselves. In this respect, the assistance to the smaller centres will be along the same lines as those outlined in the ransvaal reoprt.

## ORGANISATION COMMISSION APPENDIX IV

# RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE STANDING COMMITTEE IN THE EASTERN CAPE

## Regional Council

It should consist of the Regional Director, the SRC President of Rhodes or his representative, all Local Committee Chairmen and two directors from each Local Committee. Observers will be admitted with speaking but no voting rights.

This Council will meet once a month. This is fairly feasible in this region.

#### Responsibility

This Council will be responsible for divvussion and implementation of NUSAS policy at a regional level. It will act as liaison between the centres and branches. It will make recommendations to the Standing Committee and will implement recommendations of the Standing Committee where practicable. It will elect directors of the Regional Departments. It will consolidate all work in the Region.

## Regional Standing Committee

This committee shall consist of the Regional Director, the SRC president of Rhodes and one representative from Alive. This last shall be decided upon by the two Alice branches concerned. If no decision is reached he shall be appointed by the Regional Director and the Rhodes SRC President. The Regional Director shall act as chairman of the Standing Committee. He shall be responsible for calling meetings. The other two members can together request the Chairman to call a meeting, which in this case he is obliged to do.

This Committee shall meet before Regional Council meetings, or when an emergency arises. It shall not meet less than once every two months. This committee shall be responsible for Regional planning. It shall have the power to recommend lines of a tion to the Regional Council which lines of action are not necessarily binding on the Council. It may exercise poer of veto on decisions of the Council.

#### Local Committee Departments

On the Federal Seminary campus, Studies, Scholarships and Travel Departments are redundant. At Rhodes these are still quite feasible. In addition, most services offered by the enefits epartment are not needed on the Alice campus. At Rhodes most of these are needed, with a few exceptions. It would be to the advantage of both Rhodes and Alice to combine at a Regional level on Fund Raising and elici. At Rhodes it is feasible to combine to a certain extent the Departments of Students Relations, Studies and Pubs and Pubs. This Department could operate at a Regional level, with the exception as already mentioned of Studies. The Welfare Departments can also operate on a regional level, especially in regard to work camps.

#### To summarise

Student Relations, Pubs and Pubs and Welfare and Fund Raising and Relief are definitely most desitable when operated on a Regional level. Benefits coordination is possible in regard to UPE and St Paul's. Sc clarships coordination - UPE, St Pauls. Travel should remain a separate department.
