MINUTES

48TH ANNUAL CONGRESS

UNIVERSITY OF CAPE TOWN

Mr Pretorius, in the chair opened the meeting and welcomed the delegates to the congress.

The leaders of the delegations introduced the members of their delegations and the claiming of votes took place.

Wits claimed 16 votes, University of Natal, Durban claimed 10 votes, University of Natal, Pietermaritzburg claimed 8 votes, University of Cape Town claimed 14 votes, Rhodes University claimed 8 votes, SACHED Johannesburg claimed 1 vote and the Executive claimed 9 votes. This totaled 66 votes.

The Durban delegation asked for an additional vote based on an increase in student numbers. After being investigated by the Steering Committee, it was decided that as the fees paid by the Durban SRC constituted sufficient student numbers for claiming of 11 votes and the claiming of the additional vote meant that an additional R125,00 in affiliation fees had to be paid, the Durban SRC agreed to this payment on condition that the other affiliated centres had paid the full amounts owing for their affiliation fees.

Messages of support and solidarity were read out to the congress.

SOUTH AFRICAN CHARTER OF STUDENT RIGHTS

ARTICLE I

(a) EDUCATION SHALL BE FREE AND AVAILABLE TO ALL. ACCESS TO ELEMENTARY EDUCATION SHALL BE COMPULSORY TO ENABLE ALL TO DECIDE ON GROUNDS OF ABILITY ALONE WHETHER OR NOT TO PURSUE HIGHER EDUCATION



- (b) ALL STUDENTS SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT OF ACCESS TO A FULL EDUCATION, ENABLING THEM TO REALISE THE POTENTIALITIES OF THEIR CHOICE; AND THIS EDUCATION SHALL BE AVAILABLE TO ALL STUDENTS ON A BASIS OF EQUALITY WITHOUT REGARD FOR RACE, COLOUR, ECONOMIC CIRCUMSTANCE, SEX, POLITICAL, RELIGIOUS OR OTHER CONVICTIONS, NATIONAL OR SOCIAL ORIGIN, PROPERTY, BIRTH SOCIAL STANDING OR ANY OTHER STATUS
- (c) EDUCATION SHALL BE DIRECTED TO THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE HUMAN PERSONALITY AS DESIRED BY THE INDIVIDUAL, AND TO THE STRENGTHENING OF RESPECT FOR HUMAN RIGHTS AND FUNDAMENTAL FREEDOMS AND TO THE PURSUIT AND EXTENSION OF THE KNOWLEDGE OF MANKIND. IT SHALL PROMOTE UNDERSTANDING, TOLERANCE AND FRIENDSHIP AMONG ALL NATIONS, RACIAL AND RELIGIOUS GROUPS; AND BE WITHOUT BIAS TOWARDS OR AGAINST, ANY OF THE IDEOLOGICAL OR RELIGIOUS BELIEFS OF THE DIFFERENT GROUPS OF OUR COUNTRY
- (d) NO STUDENT WHO HAS THE NECESSARY ACADEMIC QUALIFICATIONS SHALL BE DENIED THE RIGHT TO STUDY AT A UNIVERSITY OR AN INSTITUTE OF HIGHER EDUCATION, EXCEPT FOR REASONS RELATING TO THE SAFETY AND WELLBEING OF THE STUDENT, UNIVERSITY OR INSTITUTE OF HIGHER LEARNING OR SOCIETY AS A WHOLE, AND ALL STUDENTS WILL BE EVALUATED ON KNOWLEDGE AND ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE ONLY FOR PURPOSES OF GRANTING ACADEMIC CREDIT

#### ARTICLE 2

- (a) ALL STUDENTS, IN THE COURSE OF THEIR PURSUIT OF KNOWLEDGE, SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT OF FREEDOM OF OPINION AND EXPRESSION, AND SHALL BE FREE TO SEEK, RECEIVE AND IMPART INFORMATION AND IDEAS THROUGH ANY MEDIA
- (b) ALL STUDENTS SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT OF ACCESS TO WHAT HAS BEEN CONTRIBUTED UNIVERSALLY BY MANKIND IN TERMS OF KNOWLEDGE
- (c) ALL STUDENTS OF THE RIGHT TO CREATIVE THOUGHT AND DEVELOPMENT OF NEW IDEAS AND SHALL BE GIVEN THE OPPORTUNITY TO EXPERIMENT ON THESE NEW THOUGHTS AND IDEAS, WITHOUT PREJUDICE TO THE RIGHTS AND LIBERTIES OF OTHERS.
- (d) THIS FREEDOM OF THOUGHT AND EXPRESSION SHALL NOT BE SUPPRESSED DIRECTLY OR INDIRECTLY BY THE UNIVERSITY, THE GOVERNMENT, THE AUTHORITIES OF THE INSTITUTE OF HIGHER EDUCATION, ANY ORGAN OF STUDENT GOVERNMENT OR ANY OTHER BODY

#### ARTICLE 3

STUDENTS SHALL HAVE FREEDOM OF PEACEFUL ASSEMBLY AND ASSOCIATION, WITHOUT INTERFERENCE OR INTIMIDATION

#### ARTICLE 4

ALL STUDENTS SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT TO CHOOSE THE UNIVERSITY OR INSTITUTE OF HIGHER EDUCATION IN WHICH THEY DESIRE TO STUDY; AND THEY SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT TO CHOOSE FREELY AND WITHOUT FORCE OR PRESSURE THE COURSE OR TYPE OF STUDY WHICH THEY INTEND TO PURSUE

#### ARTICLE 5

ALL STUDENTS SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT TO PROPER AND ADEQUATE FACILITIES FOR STUDY AND RESEARCH. IT SHALL BE THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE UNIVERSITY, OR INSTITUTE OF HIGHER EDUCATION, TO PROVIDE THE PROPER FACILITIES SO THAT STUDENTS SHALL OBTAIN THE MAXIMUM BENEFIT FROM THEIR EDUCATION

#### ARTICLE 6

- (a) ALL STUDENTS SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT TO PROPER AND ADEQUATE LIVING CONDITIONS
- (b) STUDENTS SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT TO REST AND LEISURE THROUGH PERIODIC HOLIDAYS AND A REASONABLE LIMITATION OF WORKING HOURS

ARTICLE 7

- (a) ALL STUDENTS SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT TO PURSUE EDUCATION IN AN ATMOSPHERE OF FREEDOM DEVOID OF STATE CONTROL, AND TO DEVELOP IN FREE AND AUTONOMOUS INSTITUTIONS
- (b) STUDENTS SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT TO DEMAND THAT THERE BE COMPLETE AUTONOMY AND ACADEMIC FREEDOM IN THEIR UNIVERSITIES OR INSTITUTES OF HIGHER EDUCATION. IT SHALL BE THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE GOVERNMENT TO GRANT COMPLETE AUTONOMY AND ACADEMIC FREEDOM TO THE UNIVERSITIES AND INSTITUTES OF HIGHER LEARNING

ARTICLE 8

ALL STUDENTS SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT TO PARTICIPATE ACTIVELY AT ALL LEVELS IN THE GOVERNMENT OF THEIR UNIVERSITY OR INSTITUTE OF HIGHER EDUCATION. IT SHALL BE THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE UNIVERSITY OR INSTITUTE OF HIGHER EDUCATION TO ALLOW STUDENTS TO PARTICIPATE BY ADMITTING STUDENTS TO BE EQUAL MEMBERS OF ALL BODIES AND COMMITTEES CONCERNED WITH STUDENT INTERESTS

ARTICLE 9

ALL STUDENTS SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT TO A FREE STUDENT PRESS IN WHICH THEY CAN EXPRESS THEIR VIEWS AND OPINIONS ON ANY SUBJECT, CRITICISE AND PUBLICISE ANY MATTER THEY FEEL TO BE RELEVANT WITHOUT INTERFERENCE, PRESSURE, SUPPRESSION OR CENSORSHIP BY THE UNIVERSITY, INSTITUTE OF HIGHER LEARNING, THE STATE OR ANY OTHER BODY, SINCE THE FREEDOM OF EXPRESSION AND DEBATE IS BASIC TO ANY COMMUNITY IN A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY

ARTICLE 10

ALL STUDENTS HAVE THE RIGHT AND SHALL BE GRANTED THE FREEDOM TO FORM AND JOIN THEIR OWN UNIONS, CHOOSE THEIR OWN REPRESENTATIVES AND MANAGE THEIR OWN AFFAIRS WITHOUT ANY POLITICAL OR ECONOMIC INTERFERENCE OR OTHER FORMS OF PRESSURE BY THE UNIVERSITY, INSTITUTE OF HIGHER EDUCATION THE STATE OR ANY OTHER BODY

ARTICLE 11

ALL STUDENTS SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT TO FORM AND PARTICIPATE IN ANY GROUP FOR INTELLECTUAL, RELIGIOUS, SOCIAL, SPORTING, ECONOMIC, POLITICAL OR CULTURAL PURPOSES; AND TO SHARE IN ANY SCIENTIFIC, LITERARY OR ARTISTIC ADVANCEMENT AND THEIR BENEFITS

ARTICLE 12

(a) ALL STUDENTS ACCUSED OF INDISCIPLINE SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT TO FREE TRIAL WITH LEGAL AND OTHER COUNSEL AND NOT BE ARBITARILY DISMISSED FROM THE UNIVERSITY OR INSTITUTE OF HIGHER EDUCATION. IT SHALL BE THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE UNIVERSITY OR INSTITUTE OF HIGHER EDUCATION TO STATE THE CHARGES AND ALLOW THE ACCUSED TO DEFEND AND REPRESENTED BY COUNSEL SO THAT JUSTICE CAN AND SHALL BE SEEN TO BE MAINTAINED

(b) ALL STUDENTS ACCUSED OF CRIMINAL OR CIVIL OFFENCES SHALL BE FREE TO BE PRESENT AT CLASSES AT THE UNIVERSITY OR INSTITUTE OF HIGHER EDUCATION, EXCEPT FOR REASONS RELATING TO THEIR PHYSICAL OR EMOTIONAL SAFETY OR WELL-BEING OR FOR REASONS RELATING TO THE SAFETY AND WELL BEING OF STUDENTS, STAFF OR THE PROPERTY OF THE UNIVERSITY OR INSTITUTE OF HIGHER LEARNING

(c) NO STUDENT SHALL BE PENALISED BY BOTH THE STATE AND THE UNIVERSITY OR INSTITUTE OF HIGHER EDUCATION FOR THE SAME ACT WHETHER CONSTITUTING A CRIMINAL OR CIVIL OFFENCE

ARTICLE 13

STUDENT RECORDS SHALL NOT BE RELEASED TO PERSONS OUTSIDE THE UNIVERSITY OR INSTITUTE OF HIGHER EDUCATION EXCEPT AT THE REQUEST OF THE STUDENT CONCERNED; OR THROUGH LEGAL PROCEEDINGS, IN WHICH CASE THE STUDENT SHALL BE INFORMED OF THE RELEASE

ARTICLE 14

ALL STUDENTS SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT TO WORK FOR THE INALIENABLE RIGHTS AND FREEDOMS AS LAID OUT ABOVE, AND TO CRITICISE AND PUBLICISE ANY DIRECT INTERFERENCE, OR ANY ATTEMPTS BY MEANS OF INDIRECT POLITICAL OR ECONOMIC PRESSURE OR ANY OTHER MEASURES BY ANYBODY TO INTERFERE WITH THEIR RIGHTS AND THE RIGHTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OR INSTITUTE OF HIGHER LEARNING

Report of the August Campaign Commission to National Student Assembly

In terms of the motion passed at the emergency session of NSA, the commission met to formulate proposals for a major national student campaign in August. It is recommended by the commission that the campaign should focus on civil rights and thus be called the "Civil Rights Campaign".



The focus on civil rights was recommended by the commission for the following reasons

- (1) It can be linked to the bannings which were the initial motivation for the campaign
- (2) It can be tied in with the police brutality during the June protests
- (3) It will serve as a focus for the steady erosion in South Africa of student and human rights, notably in the field of labour and economics
- (4) It will also emphasise the need to prepare for future attacks on our own organisations in particular and the right of students in general.
- (5) It will co-incide with the activities planned by AQUARIUS on the same topic

The commission recommends the following to NSA

- (1) that throughout the campaign the policy of non-violence be stressed
- (2) that adequate coverage be given to the basic causes of the abrogation of civil rights in this country
- (3) that the role of Head Office be to co-ordinate the campaign, to distribute relevant information to campuses for use during the campaign, to ensure that adequate publicity is given to the campaign, but that it be left up to the students on the campuses concerned to decide
  - a) on those aspects of the campaign which they wish to stress
  - b) that the decision as to the mode of implementation of these aspects of the campaign be left to the individual campuses to decide in the light of their own campus situations
  - c) that SRCs warn the students to prepare for a possible government onslaught during examination time or vacations

General Benefits

The present scheme in which the SRCs are solely responsible for student benefits appears to be inadequate in some areas. There are some schemes such as a guide for travelling students as to vacation accomodation, ional employment and money saving facilities that need national co-ordination. Furthermore students are often unaware of benefits already available to them. The committee therefore recommends the following - that one of the fulltime staff at head office include in his/her portfolio that of "National Benefits Officer" with the following responsibilities

- (a) to ensure that ideas ulate freely between affiliated centres
- (b) To operate schemes that require national coordination
- (c) To institute investigations into foreign student benefits schemes with a view to the introduction of such benefits in South Africa by the National Union
- (d) To prduce a booklet on benefits available in every affiliated centre for distribution to every student at these centres at the beginning of the year

Seminars

The Seminars committee reports as follows -

The committee recognised initially that seminars should as far as possible promote amongst delegates the development of critical and evaluative thought about aspects of society. At the same time, it was recognised that seminars should provide the planning of future action, although this would be the choice of the delegates.

A. LOCAL SEMINARS

In addition to constituent centres and local committees at these constituent centres that Freshers Reception seminars be held which would primarily be concerned with introducing students to NUSAS, its ideals, programs and projects, the committee felt that 'topic' seminars arising out of a certain situation on campus and which was regarded with concern by students be held, eg seminars on 'Student Protest' or 'The meaning of FreedEducation' would probably have been relevant during the recent protests. Again, the commission felt that it was up to the participants whether these seminars would be action-orientatdd or not.

### B. Regional Seminars

The commission felt again that it could not lay down hard and fast rules for these seminars, although they recommended that regional seminars be related as far as possible to current events, trends and attitudes within the region

### C. National Seminars

Discussion centres largely around the function of National Seminar, centring to some extent on whether the seminar should be concerned with general and therefore somewhat superficial critical examination of South African society, or whether the seminar should be concerned with specific aspects of South African society such as 'Education'. A minority feeling was that the topic should be more specific. It was agreed that national seminars should be planned with a particular topic in mind. Four or five papers on this topic, presenting different view-points should be presented and delegates should then be allowed to evaluate these papers, thrashing out similarities and differences in these papers. Working on this basis would promote the development of well-founded and independently reached critique on the part of delegates of aspects of society. The committee further recommended that aspects of this topic or others should also be examined

1. Affiliate seminar - the committee recommended that affiliate national seminars be held

2. Leadership training - the committee felt that the term "Leadership Training" was a misnomer, suggesting either counter indoctrination or a Dale Carnegie course. National seminars did not and should not fall into either of these categories but should allow for (1) the development of critical thought  
(2) enabling students to get together and thrash out common areas of concern

The committee felt that the term 'leadership training' is a misnomer. Some members, however, felt that it would probably be perfectly adequate merely to define and set down our understanding of the terms leadership training.

Preparation for national seminar was considered essential. Reading lists of basic material should be circulated several weeks before national seminar, as has been done over the past few years

Length: seminars should be shortened to two and a half days  
Again, a minority group disagreed with this suggestion.

### D. December seminar

The committee endorsed the idea of a second congress in December but recommended strongly that the congress be preceded by a seminar allowing (1) for discussion of general trends in the student community and (2) for formation of plans for the affiliates.

SRC involvement in the seminar should be promoted

### E. SRC seminars

The committee recommended that SRCs hold re-assessment seminars on their functions and the compatibility of their structures with the adequate fulfilment of these functions

### F. General

The commission recommended that at all levels within the national union, local, regional, SRC and national constant reassessment of plans take place

- (1) Nominations would be called for, and must be seconded. Nominations from affiliate congresses would also obviously be taken.
- (2) If a nomination was unopposed the nominee would be declared elected.
- (3) If there was more than one nomination for the post, nominees would leave the meeting as well as the visitors. Discussion would then follow. Speeches should be in favour of a nominee rather than against a nominee. The nominees would then return to the meeting and would be entitled to vote
- (4) Voting would be by secret ballot
- (5) Only voting members of the Student Assembly would be entitled to vote in elections and alternate delegates were asked to move to one side to facilitate the distribution and collection of ballot papers
- (6) If there were more than two nominations, the candidate with the most votes would have to receive more votes than the other two candidates combined, that is, an overall majority. If this was not the case, the candidate with the least number of votes would be eliminated and a revote taken.
- (7) reminded people standing of correlated policy which expressed the hope that students standing for executive positions would be sure that they could serve their full term of office before accepting positions
