his Land Is Our Land tells a photographic story of South Africa's rural people, their ties to the land and their struggle for land rights. The exhibition contains work by well-known local photographers Paul Weinberg, Cedric Nunn, Santu Mofokeng and Paul Grendon.

An educational programme will support the exhibition and will comprise talks on land issues, a tour of the exhibition and a photographic workshop.






Richtersveld, Namaqualand
