

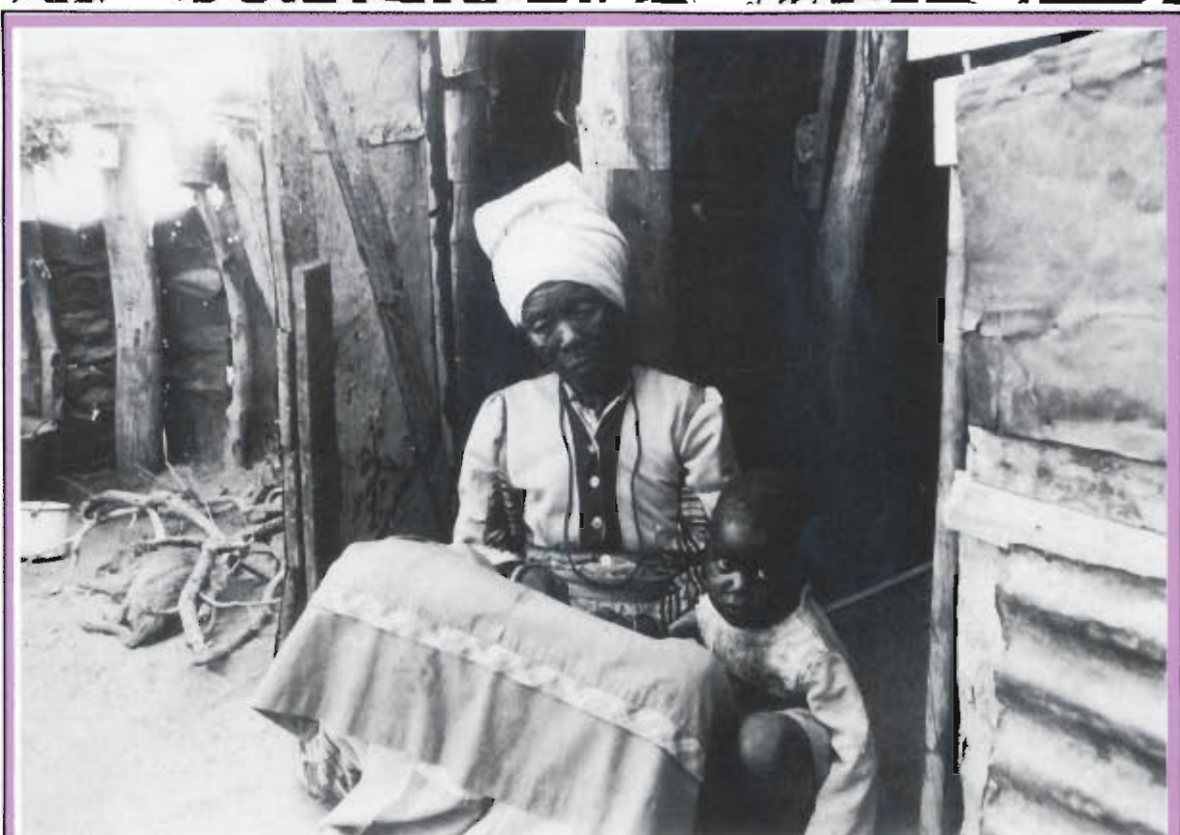
BOYCOTT PRODUCTS OF APARTHEID

Faces protected against the cold wind in 'sunny' South Africa. Seasonal farm workers on white owned farms earn £10 — £15 a month for a 12 hour day.



Women workers in the textile industry doing back breaking work for low wages. They are not wearing protective masks. The products of this exploitation are sold in Britain.

Watch out for 'made in South Africa' on labels such as: Country Casuals, Rex Trueform, Miss Cassidy and others.



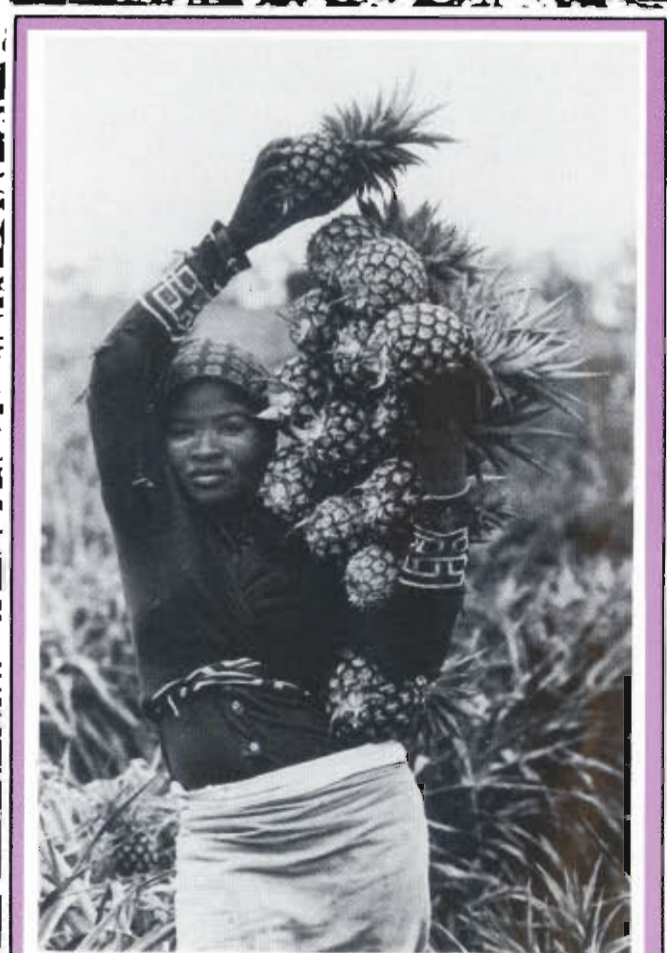
Women in the rural areas of Namibia.

The men are migrant workers in diamond and uranium mines and in white industry. The women are left behind as sole providers for children and the elderly.

Fruit is mostly picked by black women and children in South Africa and Namibia.

60% of canned fruit and vegetables exported by South Africa is consumed by Britain and the EEC.

Watch out for fresh fruit sold under the label of CAPE and OUTSPAN.



Pineapples sold in Britain are picked by women in the Ciskei Bantustan earning £5 a week.

Bantustans ('homelands') make up 13% of South Africa. 72% of South Africans are black. They are expected to survive in these 'homelands' if not needed by white industry in white South Africa — 87% of the land.
