XI. OTHER INFORMATION

=====

1. Only one paper each from the ANC - NEC,
COSATU, ANC - DEP, EROSA and Economic Trends
Group will be presented in the plenary session
of the first day.
2. Some papers will be presented within their
respective working groups. The rest will serve
as background papers for the relevant working
groups. This procedure is necessary as our
time is limited.

3. Two or three papers will be presented within each working group. One from inside South Africa and from outside South Africa and/or any other paper which the working group may consider relevant and important.
4. Papers should be policy-oriented and not academic treatises, therefore, they should be brief and to the point. Remember this workshop is to provide policy guidelines to assist with negotiations for a post-apartheid economy.
5. Terms of Reference for the Working Groups:
 - (a) There will be 6 or 7 working groups of 8 - 9 persons each
 - (b) Working groups will be organised around the following subject areas:
 - 1) International Trade and Finance
 - 2) Monetary, Fiscal and Finance Policy (including Investment, Control over monopolies and macro-economic issues related to unemployment)
 - 3) Industrial Restructuring (including energy and transport)
 - 4) Mining
 - 5) Agriculture, Food Production and Land
 - 6) Labour, Human Resource Development, Gender issues (including labour markets and labour relations) and Social Security Policies
 - 7) Other
 - (c) 2 or 3 papers to be presented in each working group as follows - one from inside SA and one from outside SA and/or one other which the working group may consider important and relevant.
 - (d) Each working group will be required to present two short summarised documents dealing with the following:
 - 1) Recommendations for Policy Guidelines, options and perspectives
 - 2) Future collaboration and work around research priorities and how these will be achieved

- (e) The working group reports will be presented towards the end of the last day of the workshop. This means that working groups will have almost one and a half days for the work. It is also possible that groups may have to work into the night.
6. All the above are suggestions which can be changed if necessary.
 7. The Zimbabwe Economic Unit in conjunction with the ANC Chief Representative's Office is hosting the workshop. They will be responsible for the following:
 - 1) Receiving and transporting delegates
 - 2) Immigration clearance
 - 3) All Protocol issues
 - 4) Coordination of Rapporteurs
 - 5) Liaison with Coordination, Administrative and Secretarial services
 - 6) Any other tasks
 8. The Office for Research and Social Action (ORSA) of the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) is the main sponsor of the workshop. Other sponsors include COSATU, ANC Department of Manpower Development and Canadian University Students Overseas (CUSO)/Zambia.
 9. The Frontline States Study Programme of the ORSA/LWF will be responsible for coordination, administrative and secretarial services which include:
 - 1) Provision of Transport and Drivers
 - 2) Accommodation and Conference facilities
 - 3) Purchase and Reservations of Air Tickets, Airport Tax
 - 4) Disbursement of funds
 - 5) Provision of secretarial services
 - 6) Communication facilities (telephone, telex, fax)
 - 7) Purchase and provision of stationery

- 8) Provision of collating pre-conference documentation
 - 9) Registration of delegates
 - 10) Production of minutes, documents, reports, recommendations during workshop
 - 11) Liaison with link persons from the Economic Unit in Zimbabwe
