Robert Berold is a poet and editor. Two anthologies of his work have appeared, *The Door to the River* and *The Fires of the Dead*. He lives on a farm outside Grahamstown, and edits South Africa's premier poetry magazine, *New Coin*.

Fran Lisa Buntman was a founder member of Jews for Social Justice in the 1980s. She is currently completing a PhD in politics at the University of Texas at Austin. Her dissertation examines political prisoner resistance in Robben Island prison, and its effects on South African politics.

Harriet Gavshon is a film maker. She produced many of the Ordinary People programmes, a series of award-winning, critically acclaimed documentaries reflecting facets of South Africa's life and people.

Mark Gevisser is a journalist who has written extensively for the Mail & Guardian. He co-edited a book, Defiant Desire, which documents gay life, history and writing in South Africa.

Julie Gordon is a journalist.

Jocelyn Hellig is an Associate Professor and Head of the Department of Religious Studies at the University of the Witwatersrand. She has published widely on South African Jewry and lectures on world religions.

Bernard Levinson is a poet whose first collection, From Breakfast to Madness, won critical acclaim. He has published several other collections, as well as prose. Levinson is also a psychiatrist and currently practises as a sex therapist in Johannesburg.

Steven Robins is an anthropologist who lectures at the University of the Western Cape.

Joseph Sherman is Associate Professor in the Department of English at the University of the Witwatersrand and Editor of Jewish Affairs. His major research interest is Yiddish literature. He has edited seven books, including From a Land Far Off, an anthology of South African Yiddish stories in English translation.

Geoff Sifrin is a journalist and award-winning architect who was born in Johannesburg in 1948. He holds degrees from the Universities of the Witwatersrand and Cape Town, and was a Fulbright Scholar at the Carolina State University. His book, To Gershn, is the chronicle of a Jewish family from its origins in a Belorussian shtetl in the early 1800s to 1995 in Nelson Mandela's South Africa.
